

Thank you! Thank you for the trust you display in your pastor. I am deeply honored and truly appreciative. I am writing this before I leave on Sabbatical. You will read it after I am gone. Please know that I am not "gone" only taking a leave to renew, restore and regenerate so that I can continue to serve effectively as your pastor.

I remember with some fear and trepidation the preparations for my first Sabbatical, now some ten years ago. I knew I needed some down time. I was tired. I was grouchy. I couldn't see clearly what I felt God wanted us to be about here at Grace Church. You were fearful. You thought I was being sneaky and using this time to check out a different congregation somewhere else. Boy were you surprised when I came back and now I've stayed another decade. Maybe this time you are secretly hoping that I would look elsewhere? No, I'm not serious. You have made it clear that you continue to appreciate my leadership and I hope I have made it clear how much I love serving you and God's people in this place.

Sabbaticals are gaining in popularity in congregational settings, however, there continues to be much confusion about their purpose. In our sabbatical leave policy for Grace Church we begin with some information. It reads like this: "Sabbatical = a leave of absence for rest, travel or research (Webster's).

"A sabbatical is a period of time (usually three months) during which rostered ministers set aside their normal responsibilities at congregations for the purpose of renewal. For a number of years the ELCA has encouraged its congregations to offer sabbaticals to its pastors. Congregational sabbaticals focus on the total person, the pastor's physical, emotional, spiritual and intellectual needs. The concept of sabbatical is grounded on the biblical idea of Sabbath rest. The example of Jesus, who frequently sought out a quiet place where he could meditate and pray, away from the constant demands of the crowds, is a strong model for a sabbatical."

I have found that I love a very complex and demanding ministry setting. I suspect this is part of the reason that I love serving in the city. The addition of the responsibilities as Assistant to the Bishop of the Nebraska Synod only expands that complexity. I thoroughly love the work that I am called to do. I know I don't always do it the best I should but I guess that is the tradeoff for multitasking and multiple demands. One thing for sure, it requires a great deal of energy. Thankfully, God has given me plenty of energy for this work, however, I have come to a point, once again, where I need some down time to recharge my batteries.

I plan to shut off my phone, hang up my keys, stop attending meetings, travel a bit and hopefully do some personal reading for enjoyment. I will miss seeing you for these next two months. I will miss hearing about your life. I will miss leading worship. I will miss celebrating with you the great mysteries of our faith through Lent and Easter. However, I will only be gone two months and then I will return.

I would like you to pray for me. Pray that I might get the rest and renewal I need. Pray that God will give me a vision of what God wants us to embark on, together, in the next four years. Pray that God will not only help me see but will also prepare the way for all of us to serve in love and care.

Please welcome and extend your wonderful care to Pastor Neal Von Seggern, and his wife Ardis, as he leads worship during my time apart.

The Letter



I just re-read a great letter from a old friend. I was feeling a little overwhelmed about all the things that had to be accomplished. I stumbled back across a letter written many years ago. The friend began by encouraging me in my spiritual life. He encouraged me to stop and take stock in what God has been doing in my life. He reminded me that everything that I am trying

to do for God is not MY doing but all part of God's plan.

I've been working on some "new stuff" for God's people. I thought about how original my idea was. Maybe there was a little self congratulations in it. My friend reminded me in his letter that God had everything about me and what I'd do in mind long before I was born. So much for my NEW idea. It was His idea all along. My focus was all wrong. No wonder the work made me tired.

He planned for me to be free...free from everything that could trip me up and keep me from living an abundant life. My friend reminded me that by the sacrifice of Jesus on the cross, God has provided for EVERY need. God has a plan for every situation I find myself in. I quote from the letter, "Long before we first heard of Christ and got our hopes up, he had his eye on us, had designs on us for glorious living, part of the overall purpose he is working out in everything and everyone."

I must confess the words, "glorious living" haven't been the way I've been feeling about life. Stressed...out of control...overwhelmed...exhausted. These aren't words that compute with **glorious living.** His letter continues.. "That's why, when I heard of the solid trust you have in the Master Jesus and your outpouring of love to all the followers of Jesus, I couldn't stop thanking God for you—every time I prayed, I'd think of you and give thanks. But I do more than thank. I ask—ask the God of our Master, Jesus Christ, the God of glory—to make you intelligent and discerning in knowing him personally, your eyes focused and clear, so that you can see exactly what it is he is calling you to do, grasp the immensity of this glorious way of life he has for his followers, oh, the utter extravagance of his work in us who trust him—endless energy, boundless strength!"

I don't know about what you might want for yourself but I would love to feel the "utter extravagance of his work" in me. I want "endless energy and boundless strength" to do the work I feel God has called me to do. According to the letter, all I have to do is refocus my heart and faith in the direction of God's ability to do what HE had planned before the beginning of the world. My only responsibility is to turn toward God, deliberately listen to His plan and open my hands and heart to do what He asks. I have no cause to brag about what God is using me for. It's His plan. I'm just the way He will implement that plan...if I'm willing.

So as I continue to do the work that God has set before me, I want to remember one last thing from the letter. My friend writes, "God can do anything, you know—far more than you could ever imagine or guess or request in your wildest dreams! He does it not by pushing us around but by working within us, his Spirit deeply and gently within us."
