An A dvent Message From the Pastor

The End and The Beginning

No, this is not the title of a new book. It is a declaration of the change in seasons of the church year. On Sunday, November 26, we will celebrate Christ the King. The green season of summer and the ingathering of autumn are completed. The church year ends not with a whimper but with an explosion of praise to the "one who was, who is, and who will be." We rejoice with the psalmist who writes, "My heart, therefore, is glad, and my spirit rejoices; my body also shall rest in hope." We rest in hope because we know that endings with God are really beginnings.


So we begin with Advent on December 3. The time of Advent is a threshold, a gateway, a bridge. On the last Sunday, Christ the King, we heard the words from the Revelation of St. John: "I am the Alpha and the Omega, ..." Now, as Advent begins, we will hear words about the "coming days." We will hear about a God that breaks into history long ago but also today.

Advent is not simply a time of waiting for Jesus to be born. It is a period of weeks infused with the import of God's future now. The coming of Advent is not some past event nostalgically remembered that we then pretend to wish for now. It is the real in-breaking of God's future into the present here and now.

Advent means "coming." This one that loves humankind so intensely comes to be in and among us. Truly we watch, we wait, but more than that we act on this stirring of God. We become the holy participants in God's unfolding drama of bringing peace and justice to our world.

I invite you to consider this Advent time as The End of those things you wish to change and The Beginning of a new spiritual journey to become God's holy people in this time and place.





John Ivo Mounto has arrived in Sudan safety. He sent word back to Titus, the lay person serving the Sudanese Church at Grace. He is currently in Juba but expects to go to Khartoum in the next few weeks.







From The Editor



I had an interesting phone call at the church the week before Thanksgiving. A pastor called to chat with Pastor Laaker but had to leave a message because Pastor Laaker was on the other line. The caller, Pastor John, asked me if I was really busy this week. I replied that it was a very intense time with quite a few things to get done before the holiday. Spontaneously, Pastor John prayed for me by saying something like, "Father, be with this woman as she does her work. Send the Holy Spirit to give her wisdom and strength." I interrupted his prayer by saying that I needed to know what to write for the newsletter. He continued his short prayer by saying, "Holy Spirit, talk through her and give her the right message to tell." I thanked him for his words. I told him that he had blessed me with his prayer for me, that God had sent him to speak to me by "divine appointment." I became more aware of the Holy Spirit's power working through me as the day progressed. Pastor John's intercession for me was answered.

As I began to write, Isaiah 11:2, a verse I had pondered on earlier in the month came back to my attention.

"And the Spirit of the Lord shall rest upon Him—the Spirit of wisdom and understanding, the Spirit of counsel and might, the Spirit of knowledge and of reverential and obedient fear of the Lord—And shall make Him of quick understanding, and His delight shall be in the reverential and obedient fear of the Lord." (Amplified Bible)

Just as the Holy Spirit is part of the Godhead, He is part of me if I have yielded my life. The Holy Spirit protects me in ways I can't understand. He gives me knowledge and wisdom that can only come from God. Isaiah says that wisdom and understanding are "on" me if the Spirit of knowledge is part of me. What He has revealed to me evokes reverence and obedience in awe of the great God I serve. It says that the Holy Spirit will "make me quick of understanding." Because I have the Holy Spirit living in me, I can understand and know what I am to do for God. The Holy Spirit can help me see with clear eyes and hear with open ears; so that I look for His loving guidance and encouragement. My choices and the judgments I make will be different because I am actively listening for the Spirit's voice.

The knowledge that God gives me is not the kind that leads me to tell the future. His knowledge gives me a light on the path I walk...just enough light for next step. As I go about my daily chores, the Spirit wants to give me understanding about the situations I find myself in and the wisdom to make the right choice.

The only way I can truly hear the Spirit is to ponder the Word of God. As a child, I was required to memorize verses for Sunday School, VBS and Bible camp. At the time, I thought it was just for memory awards and badges but now I realize the real prize is how God uses them as I grow older, to speak to me in situations. Daily time in His Word keeps the messages fresh. God shows me new things as I read.

Does the Holy Spirit rest on you through your yielded life? The promise is delightful; that you will have a reverential awe of Him and a deep desire for obedience. If you truly desire knowledge and wisdom, willingness to listen as the Spirit speaks will yield God's great power in your life.
