




Book Shelves at Home Too Full? Donate a few for the Used Book Sale!

On February 8th, a table displaying the books for sale will be set up in the Upper Fellowship Hall. Most books are priced inexpensively so be sure to stop by and take a look.







Alice Friedlander, longtime member of Grace Lutheran Church, went home to be with the Lord on Dec. 12, 2007. She was 80. Services were held at 10 a.m. December 17th at Grace Lutheran Church. Interment was at Hillcrest Cemetery.

Alice was a vibrant member at Grace until a little over a year ago. Her health deteriorated quickly in 2007. In past years, she had been active on the Council, Endowment Board, President of the Library Board, involved in quilting for Lutheran World Relief and many others responsibilities in the church. Alice was a faithful member of Grace Church since 1948. Her

gracious gift of hospitality and elegant style will be remembered by everyone she knew.

Alice had a rich career as director of volunteer services at the University of Nebraska Hospital and co-founder of the University Hospital Auxiliary. She served as director of volunteer services at University Hospital from 1972 to 1990. University Hospital is now part of The Nebraska Medical Center. In 1977, Alice co-founded the auxiliary, which provides services and financial support to UNMC and The Nebraska Medical Center. Since 1992, the auxiliary also has awarded student scholarships in Friedlander's name.

She is preceded in death by her parents, Dwight and Alice Lorimer; brother, Richard Lorimer; and son, John Friedlander. She is survived by her husband, Walter Friedlander, M.D., who founded both the department of neurology (now the department of neurosciences) and the department of medical humanities and jurisprudence (now the department of preventive and societal medicine) at UNMC. She also is survived by her children, Ron Van Oeveren and wife, Linda, Jessie Wuerst and husband, Steve, Bert Van Oeveren and wife, Bobbie, all of Omaha, Joseph Friedlander and wife Janelle, of Hazen, N.D., Jeff Van Oeveren and wife, Lyn, of Overland Park, Kan., daughter-in-law, Diane Friedlander, of Buffalo, N.Y.; sisters, Jackie Kalal and husband Don, and Dorothy McGinnis, all of Omaha; 15 grandchildren; and 12 great-grandchildren.

## Tidings of Comfort and Joy

# From the Editor



"Praise be to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of compassion and the God of all comfort, who comforts us in all our troubles, so that we can comfort those in any trouble with the comfort we ourselves have received from God." 1 Corinthians 1:3-4

### • Oh, Tidings of Comfort and Joy! •

I have been humming that musical phrase for the past two weeks. Perhaps it is because, of all the things I really want for Christmas, comfort and joy would top the list. The news is filled with people suffering; the tragic and sudden loss of loved ones, the economy and it's impact on the poor as well as the everyday family, people struggling with ice, snow, and long-term power outages with very little relief in sight - life in general with it's daily challenge.

What is "comfort?" I looked it up.

Here are a few of my favorites:


- to soothe, console, or reassure; bring cheer to.
- a person or thing that gives consolation. (I'm thinking of the old wool batted quilt my Grandma Carrie made for me. Snuggly warm!)
- a state of ease and satisfaction of bodily wants, with freedom from pain and anxiety.

I'll admit to being less than festive lately. So much grief. Many people have been a comfort to me this month. This morning, at the urging of my husband, I had a quick breakfast up at the café up the street before heading into work. Since I have lived in this neighborhood over 20 years, I know many of the servers who work there. Each one sang out a welcome as they passed my table. I asked Regina how she was and she replied, "Blessed but I need a hug." Angie smiled at me when I asked about her Christmas plans but underneath there was a sadness as she told me this would be the first Christmas since her beloved grandfather had died. She had taken some time off right before he died to care for him. "He was one of the last relatives I had," she said. "I've sort of felt numb for the last 8 months but I think I'm finally ready to move on with life." We talked of loss and of hope for the future. We hugged each other, too, because we both understood what the other was feeling. I had lunch with my close friend, Marilee, on Wednesday. I vented. She listened. (Thanks, girlfriend:-) I spoke to Brenda yesterday. We shared a few memories about our friend Alice, who moved from her broken and frail body to her heavenly body on Wednesday. We grieved together. We laughed together. We shared our burdens with each other. Tracy, Margie, Janet, Jack, Virginia, Mom, Kate, Don...all these people brought comfort to me this week.

Read Isaiah 40. This chapter is filled with words of comfort. "Why would you ever complain, O (*insert your name*), or, whine, saying, "God has lost track of me. He doesn't care what happens to me"? Don't you know any-thing? Haven't you been listening? God doesn't come and go. God lasts. He's Creator of all you can see or imagine. He doesn't get tired out, doesn't pause to catch his breath. And he knows everything, inside and out. He energizes those who get tired, gives fresh strength to dropouts." *The Message* 

As I write this Christmas is only a little more than a week away. The birth we celebrate is of a child who was God incarnate. For those of us who have lost a loved one, God understands loss and sorrow. He gave His own Son to die for our stinky, foul sin. I can take comfort in the fact that my God became flesh. He knows the struggles of human life. His comfort means something because He understands.

Here's a bit of comfort - Jesus came so that we can have a relationship with Him and because of His willingness to pay the price of sin, a death on a cross, we have a "paid in full" pardon before God. Jesus' sacrifice has opened a way for us to be worthy. All we have to do is embrace Him and His pardon. Tell Him to take control of it ALL and release our hurts, struggles and frailty to be handled by Him. The joy comes in knowing He's in charge.



Dear friends,

"What then shall we say in response to all this? If God is for us, who can be against us? For God who did not spare His own Son, but gave Him up for us all. Shall God not also graciously give us all things? Who can separate us from God's love? Shall trouble or hardship or persecution or famine or nakedness or danger or sword?...No, in all these things we are more than conquerors through Him who loved us. For I am convinced that neither death nor life; neither angels or demons, neither the present nor the future, nor any powers, nor height nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, shall be able to separate us from the love of God which is ours in Christ Jesus our Lord" Romans 8

Besieged with emotions we feel inadequate to express, our community of Nebraska has been confronted with an unspeakable terror. Yesterday, one of our children, so desperate and despondent, chose death as his response to the pain of living...and also chose to afflict so many others with murderous agony. The horrific events overwhelm us with their senselessness and frightfulness. Random outrage killed innocent people simply living life's tasks. We are filled with sorrow, confusion, anger, and fragile vulnerability.

As those who follow the Christ, how are we to respond?

We grieve together. Sadness permeates this whole event. We ache for those families whose loved ones were so treacherously stolen from their midst. The finality of this appalling choice hurts to the very core. As the painful story of Robert Hawkin's life unfolds, we again face the dark valley of broken belonging. As our children are startled out of innocence and our own mortality awakens, we bemoan the recognition of the dangers around us. In grief, we reach out, consoling each other.

We tell the truth. Evil is real. Human brokenness and sin have consequences. We do not deny reality with thoughtless mantras that hide the truth. In a society that too often hears: "Everything happens for a reason," we honestly admit our inadequacy to understand. We also challenge subtle attempts to blame God. God did not cause this, but was present in the midst of the suffering....the God of the Cross was with them and us. God's heart breaks.

We turn to God...this God who continually turns to us. In this season of "Immanuel....God with us," we recognize anew the tremendous compassion of our God who came, who comes, and who promises to be with us always. In turning, we also trust the redeeming power of our God who can transform Good Fridays into Easters. We re-tell the story of love so amazing that God would defeat sin, death, and the devil through the Cross of Christ and rise triumphant with the hope of life.

We live with hope. We move forward with purpose. Death and evil do not have the final word...God does!



Kindly, the husband offered to get the ice cream for his wife. "I'll


