Pastor led devotions from Isaiah 44:21 and Revelation 21:6 which spoke of a God who is both personal and corporate and one that gives life through water.

I am writing these notes at the end of a very busy week. At the beginning of the week, I was asked to be part of delegation of religious folks who would sit down with Senator Hagel and Representative Terry's staffs. We wanted to bring the plight of the Palestinian people to their attention and ask how we could assist in keeping them informed from our Christian contacts in Palestine.

We then gathered as a community to surround Mae Lane and her family as they laid to rest her son, John, III.

At the same time, Norene Fitle's family was gathering to surround her in with their love and care during the last moments of her earthly life. Then on Friday, July 14, we laid her to rest.

As we gathered to celebrate Norene's life and the faithfulness of God's care for her, I read a quote from Lou Buscaglia which Norene kept on her refrigerator. It reads like this:

"The majority of us lead quiet, unheralded lives as we pass through this world. There will most likely be no tickertape parades for us, no monuments created in our honor. But that does not lessen our possible impact, for there are scores of people waiting for someone just like us to come along; people will appreciate our compassion, our unique talents. Someone who will live a happier life merely because we took the time to share what we had to give. Too often we underestimate the power of a touch, a smile, a kind word, a listening ear, an honest compliment, or the smallest act of caring, all of which have a potential to turn a life around. It's overwhelming to consider the continuous opportunities there are to make our love felt."

Jesus taught his disciples many things. One of his teaching moments was captured by Matthew and we've come to know those teaching statements as "The Beatitudes." One of those statements read like this: Blessed are the meek, for they will inherit the earth. This seems to be in keeping with Lou Buscaglia's remarks. It was also true of Norene's life.

I made the following reflections. The word we render as "meek" is difficult to translate from the original Greek into English. We tend to link the works "meek" and "little," as in "he is a meek, little man." There are unfortunate implications with the word "meek" which imply a meek person is without courage, or self-respect, a broken-spirited person. The Rev. David H.C. Read tells us of being informed while he was at a Scottish church that a certain young man was going to enter the ministry. The person relaying this information said to him, "I am so pleased. He's just the type (to be a pastor) -- a nice, harmless boy." Years ago the word "meek" had a different meaning than it does today. Once upon a time the word "meek" characterized a person who was free of self-will, someone who wasn't interested in getting his or her own way, but was interested in the good of other people. This is a word that only makes sense today when it is understood as describing the relationship between God and ourselves, not simply a description of how people relate to one another. The Greek word which we translate as "meek" was used to describe a horse that was bridled, ready to run a race. The meek are those disciplined and controlled by God, ready to run God's race. To be meek is to believe that God is in charge of our lives and to let God control and direct our lives just as a horse lets its owner take charge of the bridle. When God is in control, then the whole earth is ours. Meekness is not weakness. It is a word that denotes self-control. It is a gentle, controlled, disciplined spirit.

I would hope that as we seek to live our lives in faithfulness to God's calling of each one of us, we might consider the tremendous power of God's work in and through us.

Grace Lutheran Church/Omaha to Help Grace Lutheran Church/New Orleans Recover From Hurricane Katrina

Grace Evangelical Lutheran Church is located in Lakeview, one of the areas hardest hit by Katrina. In late August, 2005, Hurricane Katrina flooded Grace Evangelical Lutheran Church in New Orleans with several feet of putrid water, inundating the sanctuary, narthex and the first floor of the educational building for weeks. The congregation, as well as the buildings were devastated. Other congregations around the country have helped the New Orleans church begin reconstruction and mold remediation.

The hurricane affected all aspects of people's lives. Many parishioners' homes were flooded. Some lost their jobs, while the jobs of others moved them out-of-town indefinitely or simply demanded more as the business attempted to survive. Sometimes, families have been split with one parent out-of-state, another in New Orleans and the kids living with other family where they started attending school shortly after Katrina.

The Grace Lutheran Church (Omaha) Council and Endowment Board members have approved a gift of \$1,000.00 to help Grace Lutheran Church of New Orleans with expenses and rebuilding. Additionally, a fund-raiser dinner is planned for the second Sunday in September. More details will be announced in upcoming weeks.

From the Editor

Testify

I love to hear stories. Those of you who know me also know I love to TELL stories, too. I love sharing the drama, suspense and comedy of my life with my friends. I like talking about the wonderful things that my husband does, my daughter does and my mother does. It's easy to talk about the ones we love with pride and admiration. But lately, I have become aware of how infrequently we talk about the wonderful things God does for us in our day-to-day lives. It seems awkward to talk about the intimate things God teaches us through our quiet times and through daily occurrences. In my younger years, I had a pastor who would ask me in casual conversation, "What has God been teaching you this week?" I would feel a loss for words, not because God wasn't "probably" doing things in my life but because a.) I wasn't expressly looking for His hand in the everyday things and b.) I felt funny sharing it

I recently attended a worship service that included seven stories or testimonies of what God had done in these men and women's lives. Each person had a different story and different perspective on what God had taught them through the difficulties of their lives. God's peace, God's patience, God's forgiveness, God's ability to radically change a life. As I listened, I found myself wanting to share what God had been teaching me, too I resolved to tell my friends about the specific things God was doing in my life. I recalled a Bible study I participated in that discussed the early church's habit of talking boldly about Christ and the story of His death and resurrection, even though it often meant persecution. The word used in the original language to describe how they shared their story was "breathing in and out." In other words, testifying or telling the story about God and his workings with them was as natural as breathing to them. I want to tell my own stories about God's goodness in my life to feel that. Natural...like breathing!

Lately, I have had a difficult time studying my Bible. I still miss the Bible that got stolen last year even though I have replaced it. I haven't been able to stick to one study and follow it through. Finally last week I remembered an old Bible my parents had given me in 1973. It's not a translation, that is, something that has been taken directly from the original languages. This Bible is a paraphrase which is written by someone who has read the passage and rewritten it in his own words. It is not the kind of Bible you read and base theology on. It is "easy" reading.

I have been rereading through the Psalms. I love this book of the Bible! It is emotional and real. The psalmist lays everything out before God. I have been pondering his willingness to be open before God. He is happy, scared, amazed, ashamed...every human emotion is woven through his words. Furthermore, many of these psalms were written to be sung by the choir and congregation. The psalmist is sharing how he feels about God and what God is doing with the people around him. The people in his community of friends are blessed by the writer's openness in revealing what God is teaching.

I began to read Psalm 71. The psalmist is reviewing his life out loud before God. He remembers how many times God gave him safety and refuge from enemies, how his relationship with God goes all the way back to childhood, how his success surprised everyone around him and the fact that all the good things that had happened in his life had come from God's blessing and protection. **Psalm 71:16** says" *I walk in the strength of the Lord God. I tell everyone that you alone are just and good.*" **Verse 17** "...*I have constantly testified to others of the wondrous things you do.*" **Verse 18**, "Give me time to tell this new generation about all your mighty miracles." **Verses 23 and 24**, "*I will shout and sing your praises for redeeming me. I will talk to others all day long about your justice and your goodness.*"

So talk to me and let me talk to you about the things God is teaching us. Let's share with one another the blessings and answers to prayer that have been a part of God's dealings with us daily. Sharing together will bring all of us closer together, both in our relationships with each other and our relationship with God!

Palestinian Troupe Al Raja shares dance moves in June!

Nebraska Synod, ELCA - Beatrice, Fremont and Omaha) - Hundreds of Nebraskans watched and talked with a group of young folk dancers, Al Raja Palestinian Dance Troupe, who came to Beatrice, Fremont and Omaha to share their culture and help Americans understand who they are and how they live. The Christian and Muslim teens from the Evangelical Lutheran School of Hope in Ramallah wanted to meet American youth and see how they live.

They got to do just that! Home stays allowed the teens and their adult sponsors to live and talk with a wide variety of Nebraska Lutheran families. They visited congregations, farms, colleges, local attractions, attended local community events, and danced. Their performances drew nearly 1,000 to the three sites.

"Al Raja was one of the best events I attended this year...it was FABULOUS. I also enjoyed the conscious-ness raising and encouragement toward P-E-A-C-E," said the Health Ministry Coordinator of Interfaith Health in Omaha.

"It was awesome and inspiring; learning where these children or young adults have come from and they still had smiles on their faces while they danced! You could genuinely see they were happy to be danc-ing," said the Grace Lutheran Church's Director of Kids at Work.

The ELCA advocates dignity and justice for all people, and peace and reconciliation among the nations. The Al Raja dancers' tour is part of the church's special strategy for engagement in Palestine and Israel. They will be part of both of the ELCA Youth Gatherings in San Antonio, Texas in July.

Voting members of the ELCA's 2005 Churchwide Assembly urged congregations to participate in the campaign, "Peace Not Walls: Stand for Justice in the Holy Land," to build awareness and engage in accompaniment and advocacy for peace with justice between Israel and Palestine.
