Following worship, they handed us a bag with clothes in it. Please put these on, they said. Well, as you can see in the pictures, these were some very elaborate clothes. It took two of the women and a couple of the men to tell us how to put these clothes and many adornments on. In fact they had to help tie the arm bands and head bands.



We were then presented to the group. We were invited to sit in the upholstered chairs because they had some things they wanted to say. John Boato stood up and began by saying that he had prepared a few words. He began by reading Psalm 133 and then he said: "We have decided and requested this time to come together, just simply to say thank you. And appreciate what you have done with us in all these years. It has been 22 years together in Christian fellowship. Evangelical-Lutheran-Church. You not just opened the door to the building, but you are open minded and open heart. You have assisted in many different ways of serving. We don't find so many people in this world like this, but you're one of them. I wish the Bishop, one greater for (Nebraska Synod) ELCA was here, so I can tell him that, this is the Man has done a lot for

the mission of Jesus Christ, but your good deeds will be rewarded in heaven by Jesus. You have assisted in things like, Green card applications, Habitat housing, the church had supported Pastor Joseph Lal education in Ethiopia, supported Leeka Church for roofing. So many other things. We have come here today to appreciate your kindness and honor you with a little gift we have, it is the beads, beads in Mabaan culture it means a lot, for someone has done something good, and when they celebrate with them. 

Yet "just two hours later, shells and cluster bombs started to fall, and many people were wounded there," Lidia said. She and her husband barely escaped.

After this horrifying attack, they fled their home to the forest. There, they hid in the basement of a ranger cabin — living off the land and donations from people in the town — until they received word their town was liberated and returned home.

Sadly, this false sense of freedom was short-lived. The very next day, there was a massive explosion in their yard. Lidia felt the great responsibility of keeping her granddaughter safe. "I couldn't hold it [together] any longer," Lidia shared. "I started crying and said, 'I can't go through this anymore."

You can imagine the heavy burden Lidia carries as she worries for the safety of her granddaughter. And feel the fear young Diana has every day, wondering if her world will ever be safe again.

Thankfully, Lidia, her husband and Diana fled to a safe haven where Diana can rest her head peacefully at night — without the threat of bombs. She can also participate in art therapy programs with other children who experienced the trauma of seeing horrific violence and feeling unimaginable heartbreak at such a young age. Continued.....
