

August was a very busy month. Omaha Public Schools began their Fall semester. Our relationship with Liberty Elementary and Spring Lake Elementary continues. I worked with our contacts with the Second Grade Teachers to

secure new book titles for reading, the number of classrooms and the number of students in those classrooms. Books have been ordered and received so that we can begin reading in September. I am grateful for the volunteers who set aside time to read to the students and share their love of learning.

McKinnis Roofing began the roof replacement on the big roof at St. Luke's during the hottest week of the month. They completed the roof work in seven days. We are now waiting for the finishing installation of the gutters and downspouts. Unfortunately, during the set-up of scaffolding on the west side, we learned of weakened roof members over the enclosed walkway. We await the determination of what needs to be done and who will be responsible for cost of repair.

Grace had a new door to the alley installed. This facilitates the receiving and distribution of the pantry goods. The new door needs to be painted so if you are wondering how you might help and would like to paint, speak to me.

The joint Discernment Team met and explored possible ideas for a new mission statement. They also began work on a new vision statement that elaborates the mission. They will meet again to explore this work further.

I am grateful for the five or six skilled musicians that have been assisting our worship time with their musical skills. Each of these talented individuals brings a special passion to the work of music for our worship.

As we enter the Fall Season, I hope each of you will consider how you might support one another, encourage one another in their faith response and discover ways to be Christ to the neighbor. The opportunity to build relationships is available each week as we gather to praise God.

The Scripture Readings from John 6 over the past few weeks have challenged us. Jesus' desire to be the bread of life for all has been the focus. The gift of himself is available to us through the bread and wine of communion. The Holy Spirit engages us through these physical means to call, gather and enlighten us in the faith. May we respond with joy.

Council Meeting Notes ~ August 13, 2024

The regular meeting of the Council was held on August 13, 2024. Council members shared prayer concerns for a member's brother, the victims of violence/ accidents/disease, people experiencing homelessness, kids starting school, Barnabas as he searches for a job and continues his studies for becoming a pastor, and for his wife's health, Pastor's sister's health, the situation in Ukraine, and for peace in the Middle East.

<u>Devotions</u>: Devotions were led by Pastor Laaker, reading the selected verses in the "Daily Texts" from Psalm 96:1 and Luke 19:37-38. The first tells us to praise God through song. The second reminds us that the disciples actively praised God.

<u>Visions for Ministry</u>: Leading Faithful Innovation by Dwight Zscheile, Michael Binder, and Tessa Pinkstaff

The authors discussed the challenge of creating discipleship with people on the outskirts, encouraged building practices from a curiosity standpoint, and shifting from a performative to a formative model of ministry. We can learn a lot from the standpoint of curiosity and wonder, and if we are open to a different approach, we have an opportunity to grow in our faith and invite others along on that journey. Read Chapter 6 for next month.

<u>Committee Reports</u>: Reports were received from the Financial Secretary and the Treasurer. Please continue to give generously.

Christian Education: Confirmation begins Wednesday online, August 21.

<u>Evangelism/Outreach</u>: We continue to provide support to Liberty: books for reading program for 2nd graders beginning in September and we have readers lined up for the 4 classrooms.

Immanuel Vision Fund money delivered more Kleenex, disinfecting wipes, pencils, and dry erase markers.

OTOC is holding a candidate accountability session on Sunday, October 20th.

Finance: Immanuel Vision - opportunity to request a grant.

<u>Property</u>: Alley Door has been installed, but we still need to clean up some of the edges and it needs to be painted. Parking Lot Door still in the works. HVAC - need to follow up. Pastor noticed that the metal brace that holds up a gutter on the south side was on the ground, possibly rusted through, so that needs to be checked out.

<u>Service/Social Ministry</u>: God's Work, Our Hands: We will collect individually wrapped snack/lunch type items and package them up with fruit and water and prepare lunch sacks to hand out to the neighborhood. We hope to have 75 sacks made. We will do this twice, once at St. Luke's to pass out on 24th Street and then again at Grace to pass out along 24th Street. Quilting - Eva would like to get that going again starting in September. There are a few ladies at St. Luke's who are interested in participating. The quilts will be donated to Lutheran World Relief. Habitat for Humanity volunteer/work opportunities coming up. A company donated 4000 non-perishable food items to the Loaves and Fishes pantry. We will get a thank you to them.

Support/Stewardship: none.

Worship: Hymn selection committee met and chose music for the next 3 months.

Unfinished Business: Grace/St. Luke's Vision Team offered a brief report.

<u>New Business</u>: Crossroads Prison Ministry September 15th - 6:00pm Service, Meal following (about 6:45pm) Pastor will talk to Pastor Edgar about possibly providing tamales for this meal, as he had indicated interest.

<u>Announcements</u>: We received a postcard from Shepherd of the Hills who will be celebrating 150 years of ministry. Amanda will provide a prayer in September.

Adjournment: The Council meeting closed in prayer and adjourned at 8:30pm



BIBLE STUDY Today's Scripture in Luke's Gospel, Luke 6:27-35, follows just after the Beatitudes and attached Curses. (Isn't it curious that Luke is the only Gospel writer who adds curses to the list of Beatitudes?) Some people look at this 'Love your Enemy' section as an extra, an optional add-on to the basics of the Beatitudes. " Oh look, it's the Golden Rule! Isn't that nice? "

When I hear that, I think, "Wait! Have you actually read these verses?" This is not quick and easy stuff! Take verse 29, for example... "To the man who takes your cloak from you, do not refuse your tunic." And Jesus repeats the idea in the next sentence. "Do not ask for your property back from the man who robs you." Does Jesus expect us to obey this command literally?(I have a feeling about that - more next month.) What a departure from the way most of us live our lives! What a contrast to the way the world works! (And Jesus has already told us to do good to those who hate us, bless those who curse us, and pray for those who treat us badly.) REALLY?

Well, I have prayed for one who treated me badly. OK, my teeth may have been clenched, but I did it. Bless those who curse us? How many of us even believe in the power of blessings and curses, as people used to believe? I don't know. I do know that Jesus wants us to be free and creative. Not holding grudges keeps us free. About creativity, I am reminded of the rabbi in "Fiddler on the Roof", who was asked by a villager if there is a blessing for the Tsar, in that time of terrible antisemitism and pogroms, the rabbi replied, "May the Lord bless and keep the Tsar... far away from us!" I like that! I like that a lot, because there is something of freedom and dignity in it, refusing to be cowed or broken by the harsh realities with which we sometimes have to live in this world. And it's funny!

I have never been robbed at gunpoint, in part because I never learned to use a cash register, and I have never worked as a store clerk or bank teller. I can imagine, though, that I would open the cash drawer at a robber's command, and I would probably say something like, "Go ahead and take all the cash you want, Honey, because I am not going to fight you for it!" Of course, that's easy to say when it's not your money. My main concern would be that we both get out of the situation alive, preferably unharmed. Why? The robber and I are both worth a whole lot more than the cash, and we need to be protected a whole lot more than it does.



Sadly, this false sense of freedom was short-lived. The very next day, there was a massive explosion in their yard. Lidia felt the great responsibility of keeping her granddaughter safe. "I couldn't hold it [together] any longer," Lidia shared. "I started crying and said, 'I can't go through this anymore.'"

You can imagine the heavy burden Lidia carries as she worries for the safety of her granddaughter. And feel the fear young Diana has every day, wondering if her world will ever be safe again.

Thankfully, Lidia, her husband and Diana fled to a safe haven where Diana can rest her head peacefully at night — without the threat of bombs. She can also participate in art therapy programs with other children who experienced the trauma of seeing horrific violence and feeling unimaginable heartbreak at such a young age. Continued.....
