BIBLE STUDY Last month, we looked at Luke's Gospel 6:27-35. This month, let us continue with

that, adding on verses 36-38, as well. I raised the question of whether Iesus wants us to take his commands here literally or not, and wrote that I had a feeling about that. My feeling is: sometimes yes, sometimes no. Another way to say it would be: it depends. This whole section of the Gospel, I think, comes out of the deep, intimate relationship that Jesus shares with his Abba, and is more about attitudes than about specific actions. So praying for someone with teeth clenched, as I once did, doesn't cut it, because the attitude of understanding and compassion isn't there.

This is made more evident in the verses we added on today. It's all about compassion, not judging, not condemning, and it's running over with generosity and abundance. Just like the Holy One! These are attitudes that I want to grow into, and are based in the awareness that it's all a gift. Everything is gifted! We are endlessly blessed by God's giving, even selfgiving, and that one's the hardest to bear, yet the most desireable, too. In that context, how much does it really matter if a thief takes an article of clothing, some jewelry, or if someone fails to return what they have borrowed? Maybe not so much, and that frees us to be creative in our responses to each other, and to all.


